

SEED OATS FOUND BADLY INFECTED

Hundreds of Samples Tested Reveal Prevalence of Smut Spores — Readily Controlled.

Controlled.

Judging from evidence obtained from tests of several hundred samples of seed oats already examined in the State seed testing laboratory at the Experiment Station at Geneva, oat smut may be extremely prevalent this year unless the proper precautions are taken to treat the seed. While oat smut is one of the most common and injurious of cercal diseases, it is easily and cheaply controlled by treating the seed with formaldehyde, says Dr. W. L. Crosier, station specialist on seed-borne diseases.

"Our tests show plainly that a high percentage of the stocks of seed oats in New York should first he very thoroly and carefully recleaned to remove smut balls, wild mustard and wild bindweed seeds, and all light diseased seeds, then thoroly treated to control smut," continues Dr. Crosier. "Many lots of seed oats so far tested this season show plainly that they are absolutely unfit for seed in their preent condition. Of the several materials available for preventing oat smut, formaldehyde solution is the one most commonly used. It is very efficient, easy to apply, costs very little, and does not injure germination.

By this method one pint of formaldehyde is diluted with one pint of water and placed in an ordinary one-quart hand sprayer. This amount of the solution will treat 50 bushels of grain and this rate of application should not be increased. The cleaned oats can be piled on any clean, tight surface, such as a canyal can be sufficiently and the solution of the solution of the solution of the solution of the solution (two strokes of the sprayer handle) is sprayed over each shovelul. After the entire pile is thus treated, it is covered with blankets or bags which have been thoroly sprayed with the solution and left for five hours, or even overnipht. The oats should her be drilled as soon as possible, or if sowing is delayed, they should be well aired by shoveling over and then placed in clean bags. Since the vapor of formaldehyde is very irritating to the eyes, nose and throat, the treatment should be made in a well ventilia's drow. Holding the sprayer close to the oats will reduce the spread of
