Governor Lehman has signed a bill making it mandatory for all election districts in New York State now using paper ballots to install voting machines within the next three years. The law is effective in 1938 and will effect over a third of the election districts in Allegany county. Expenditures for strictly county purposes in Allegany county dropped about one-third in April from those paid in March, according to reports from the office of County Treasurer (Clayton) C. Conner. The total expenditures for April were \$47,963.18.
