

The Auxiliary Women have taken Miss Michael's idea and developed it into a great national program for commemorating the sacrifice of those who died and for bringing aid to those Who sacrificed their strength in the nation's service. Early in the Winter the making of the millions of poppies which the people of America will wear on their coats the following Poppy Day 1 begun in government hospitals and convalescent workrooms maintained by the Auxiliary in many parts of the country. Hands of disabled veterans, weary of idleness, are given employment, shaping the little red flowers. Sick and discouraged men whose spirits have sunk to despair from long unemployment are given the encouraging experience of again earning money.
