County Planning Board Named

The personnel of Allegany county's planning board, as announced by Frak L. Gere, chairman of the Board of Supervisors, is as follows: Howard B. Drake, Friendship, chairman; Henry W. Brown executive secretary of the Allegany Work Bureau, Belmont, and Fred Schade, Buffalo, assistant division TERA engineer, ex-officio members.

The planning board is expected to confer with town and village boards, school authorities and others throughout the county in working up a county work program.

Alfred Has Completed Four TERA Projects

Four needed village improvement projects have been completed at Alfred at a low cost, simply the price of materials used. All other expenses were carried thru by the aid of TERA labor, granted thru the efforts of Mayor A. E. Champlin and the village board. Water lines have been installed where needed, the road and sidewalk on the Reynolds street hill changed so as to eliminate the steep grade. In all, four projects have been completed at a cost of \$1,400 with \$2,400 TERA labor contributed. An additional request for TERA aid is to be forwarded to install curbs on several of the streets.
