Mark Graves, president of the State tax commission, said that the state already has collected \$41,560,-181 in personal income taxes this year and that installment payments will bring the total yield for the fiscal year to more than \$51,000,-000.

This is \$6,000,000 more than a year ago and the largest income tax yield since 1930.

Further, there were 31,650 more income tax payers than last year and the average amount paid per return jumped from \$84.86 to \$89.17.

This, as Commissioner Graves

This, as Commissioner Graves pointed out, offers "indisputible evidence that the people of New York State are better off than they were a year ago and that we are on our way back to economic normaley."

That extra \$6,000,000 will increase the slim surplus which Governor Lehman estimated would exist in the state's finances at the end of the next fiscal year.

Commissioner Graves also announced that taxes from sales of alcoholic beverages during April were \$580,000 more than in April, 1934, and that for the first four

"These figures further substantiate my recent contention," said Commissioner Graves, "that bootlegging is decreasing. If present effective enforcement efforts are continued. I confidently predict that the illicit liquor industry will even tually be smashed."
