A study of the four year averages

A study of the four year averages of our Senior Class members which were published in a recent issue of the Hi Herald, reveals a range from 71.21 per cent to 83.48 per cent, with the second honor of 80.39 per cent, the only other average over 80 per cent.

For a class of 26 members the averages attained by the upper members are exceedingly low. This is in no way a criticism of the valedictorian and salutatorian of the class of 1935, but merely an indication of a fruitful opportunity for scholastic improvement. The average Senior Class should have at least two members with a record above 90 per cent.
