THIS WEEK IN ALBANY

What price state milk control? The answer has been supplied by Peter G. Ten Eyck, state commissioner of agriculture and markets, who revealed that New York dairymen received \$9,408,000 for milk delivered in May. That was \$2,735,543 more than for May, 1933, and \$941,989 more than for deliveries in May, 1934. The most significant feature, however, is that deliveries last month totaled 8,000,000 pounds less than in the corresponding period of 1934. The answer lies in the fact that farmers were receiving an average price of \$1.49 per 100 pounds last year and \$1.68 this year. Two years ago the average price was \$1.18. Simple calculation shows that since milk control by the State became effective the farmers have seen their returns boosted 50 cents for every 100 pounds. All this has been accomplished in the face of a sharp decline in the surplus class prices from April to May this year. The new Democratic commissioner seems to be away to a flying start in his job. It takes quite a torrent of milk to account for \$1,000,000. If there has been a dearth of strictly political news during recent weeks don't blame your correspondent. Veteran observers say that the political world, or rather the New York State section of it, is quieter

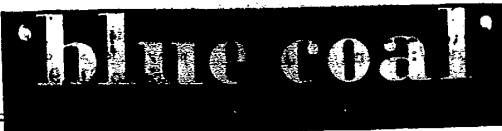
