**Rushford Votes to Build Central School**  
After voting from 2 to 8 o'clock Friday afternoon and evening, the town of Rushford decided in favor of a central school in Rushford and to erect a \$125,000 fireproof building, \$55,000 of which is a gift by the will of the late Mrs. Frank Sullivan Smith, a native of Rushford, who died a year ago in New York City.

The proposed central district will include all of the town which now has the one union school and eleven common school districts, located in the first supervisory district of Allegany county of which Frank L. Tutthill of Fillmore is superintendent. It will have an assessed valuation of nearly \$2,600,000.
