On account of the Firemen's Banquet Wednesday, the regular meeting of Andover Grange will be held on Monday evening, July 8th.

Rules Governing American Agriculturist-Grange Soft-rolled Molasses Cookie Contest, 1935.

Kind of Cookie: Entries will be limited to six soft rolled molasses cookies from each contestant. (Do not put any icing on cookies. Cookies must be round in shape and not over four inches in diameter. The rim of the cookie can be either plain or fancy.) Prizes: American Agriculturist will award the following cash prizes to winners of the State contest at the December meeting of the State Grange: \$25 first prize; \$10 second prize; \$5 third prize. Winners of Pomona Grange contests are eligible to compete in the State Contest, and winners of Subordinate Grange contests are eligible to compete in the Pomona contests.

Judging: Cookies will be judged on the following basis: General appearance, Size, Shape, Crust, Color, Smoothness, Tenderness, Crispness, Texture, Flavor, and Tenderness.

Standards governing the above scoring are as follows: Size: Not over four inches in diameter. Six cookies to an entry. Shape: Round. No icing. Rims either plain or fancy. Crust: (a) Color, delicately browned. All six cookies should be equally browned on both sides. There should be no streaks of flour left from rolling. (b) Smoothness—crust should not be bubbly nor lumpy. (c) Thinness—outer crust of cookie should be as thin as possible. (d) Crispness—crust should be crisp, not steamy. (e) Tender—crust should not be tough. Crumb: Color—should be uniform. Not streaked, for example. Texture, should be fine grained, tender, moist, elastic (springy, not doughy). Flavor: Should be well blended, even throughout, well-mixed. Flavor should not be too strong. For example, there should be no taste or odor left by soda, if soda is used. Score cards: Score cards should be filled out by each contestant. As soon as contest is over, the chairman of the Service and Hospitality Committee will collect the score cards and mail them to the American Agriculturist, Savings Bank Building, Box 3, Ithaca, N. Y.

The third and fourth degree teams of the Subordinate Grange will confer the degree on a class of candidates from Andover and a class from Alfred at Alfred Saturday evening, July 13th, and the Juveniles will also confer the degree on a class of candidates at Alfred.
