THE ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETING

Mrs. O. W. Robison and Robert Church Chosen as Trustees for Three Years.

The annual school meeting of the Andover school was held at the high school auditorium Tuesday evening. About 160 were present.

B. B. Hann, president of the Board of Education was chosen as chairman of the meeting and E. D. Baker, secretary of the board, acted as clerk.

The minutes of the 1934 school meeting was read and adopted, as was also the financial report for the year 1934-35.

A. D. Fuller, in a finely prepared statement, showed the necessity to the Andover school of an athletic field and moved the adoption of an appropriation of not over \$300 to put a roof on the new grandstand recently erected on the field.

There was a lively contest staged when it came to the choice of members of the Board of Education in

place of Mrs. Walter L. Greene and B. B. Hann, whose terms had expired. For trustee in place of Mrs. Greene, Mrs. O. W. Robison, Miss Mary Snyder and Mrs. Benjamin Conley were nominated.

In place of B. B. Hann, Mr. Hann, Clifford Howland and Robert Church were nominated, Mr. Church winning out in the third ballot.

Sewing Project Operating

The Caneadea sewing project is now operating after a wait of some time, 11,800 yards of federal cotton materials having been provided to be made into bedding, sleeping garments, towels, etc., by relief labor under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Welfare.

Rooms have been prepared for the work in the former Caneadea hotel.
