**Hornell Youth Held on Murder Charge**

Gordon Bunce, 27 year-old father of four children, is in St. James Mercy hospital, Hornell, suffering from self-inflicted gunshot wounds and awaiting trial on a charge of first degree murder, for the shooting of Mrs. Margaret Burrows, 21 year-old waitress at the Kant U-Kum Inn of Almond.

Bunce shot Mrs. Burrows in a jealous rage at the home of his mother in Hornell about 3:10 Thursday afternoon with a .22 calibre revolver which he afterwards turned on himself.

Mrs. Burrows died at 4:16 p. m. in St. James hospital where both were taken. A bullet entered her heart and a second, came within three inches of it. Bunce is thought to have a fair chance for recovery, altho he has two bullets in his head, one of which, however, are in vital spots.

Bunce will be arraigned on a charge of first degree murder as soon as his condition has sufficiently improved, which according to hospital reports will be at least 14 days.
