Much Damage Done Here

July 17.—We didn't wash away last week, even if our items didn't reach the News, but we were plenty scared. Water, water everywhere; bridges were washed out, several undermined, gorges cut across the road and flood debris everywhere. A large strip of road and some of the alfalfa field below the schoolhouse was washed away and over half of a large field of corn belonging to Dan Mullen crumbled into the water and washed away. The creek flowing thru Terrible Hollow (which was properly named) cut a new channel, taking out a large piece of road and field between Raymond Stewart's and John Crawford's. The upper end of the barn, known as the Caward barn, and belonging to Mrs. William Mullen was undermined and the creek now flows under the upper end. The barn must be torn down in order to save it. The greater portion of John Crawford's truck garden was washed away and a hole over ten feet deep was cut in the middle of it.

Land slides continue to alter the course of the water. There has been several since the flood. Nearly every house in the neighborhood leaked, even the newly-roofed. Cows pastured on the opposite side of the creek from the barns were not milked until late afternoon Monday.

Little Joyce Cummings, who is ill with erysipelas at the home of her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Earl Hale, grew much worse Monday and had to be carried across the raging torrent on a plank. They took her from Raymond Stewart's in a car over hills and thru fields to Canisteo where they called the doctor, who donned hip boots and waded water nearly to his hips to reach his office. The little Miss has made a trip every day and her many friends and neighbors hope she is on the road to recovery.

Mr. Lee, our mail carrier, missed just one day, which was Monday. He said he couldn't even get out of his house, the water was so high. He made his trip thru our valley between 3 and 4 p. m. It brought us in touch with the outside world again, as our telephone and electric lines are badly damaged.

The Purdy Creek bridge at Canisteo was not washed away, as was reported in the News last week. It was impassable only during the height of the flood. The second bridge on Purdy Creek from Canisteo was washed out.

Our farmers are repeating part of their spring work, of repairing and fences. After visiting Canisteo and Hornell and reading about the surrounding territory, we have nothing to complain about.
