The merchandise export balance of the United States for the year 1934 was \$478,000,000, according to the annual report of the Secretary of Commerce. Twelve thousand, one hundred and fifty-eight dollars will be distributed among 89 farm families in Steuben county by the rural rehabilitation corporation, thru its emergency flood relief setup.
