

THIS WEEK IN ALBANY

Albany, Aug. 7.—Ripping impatiently thru red tape, Governor Lehman has appealed directly to the White House for authority to use approximately 2,000 CCC youths in clearing debris from thousands of acres of farm land in the upstate flood area.

The Governor went directly to the President when he was informed that the Federal director of emergency conservation work lacked authority to place the CCC men at work on private property. He urged that the President extend the authority, emphasizing that the earning power of the farmers is far more important than repairs to state parks.

Countless acres of good farm land in the flooded area will become permanently useless unless the debris deposited by the roaring flood waters is cleared promptly. The state is doing its part by supplying \$150,000 for tools and equipment.

Governor Lehman told the President that there is precedent for what he proposes in hundreds of other CCC camps throughout the country, the requirement being that the work to be done under the direction of the soil erosion service.

Congressmen who toured the flood area recently said the disaster was one of the worst which ever struck the state. That is why Governor Lehman refuses to rest until every state and federal agency has done its utmost to rehabilitate the sufferers.

Opening the Democratic upstate campaign to retain control of the Assembly, Speaker Irwin Steingut told a group of Monroe county voters the other day that the campaign being conducted by the very busy Melvin C. Eaton, Republican state chairman, is being spiced with hypocrisy.

The Speaker referred to recent charges by Eaton that Vincent Daley of the Democratic state committee dictated legislative appointments.

"The Republican chairman," said Mr. Steingut, "has been indulging in a lot of unnecessary squawking. Let me point out that Eaton appeared in person at every Republican conference at Albany. It is rank hypocrisy on his part to appear in a role of attacker while doing the same thing himself within his own party."

"There has been some Republican distribution of patronage, and it has been thru Mr. Eaton. I have no fault to find with this; it is the natural thing to do. But why should he point with horror to a policy he himself pursues?"

The Speaker said the Democrats again will win 60 of the 82 New York City assembly seats; take all five of the Monroe county seats and capture at least five of the eight in Erie county.

Stepping out of their usual roles, the officials of the state conservation department and newspapermen who wrote about state activities, engaged in a baseball game the other day. Thirty-nine runs were scored in the first inning and the final score is being withheld pending the result of a recount demanded by both sides. Conservation Commissioner Lithgow Osborne hit four home runs and struck out as many times.

It is too bad that superlatives do not win elections, too bad, that is, for the Republican party in New York State. The G.O.P. in a recent press release, referred to the speaking tour of Chairman Eaton as "whirlwind" and "dynamic." But that was only the beginning. State Comptroller Morris S. Tremaine announces that the first city in the state to take advantage of the 1935 "debt equalization" law is Kingston, Ulster county.
