Fate of N. Y. & P. Railroad Undecided

At a meeting of the stockholders and potential customers along the line of the New York and Pennsylvania railroad, held in Canisteo Saturday afternoon, definite plans as to the future of the road were postponed until August 22nd. The postponement is to enable the stockholders to survey the situation and determine if the road can be continued on a paying basis.
 Guy M. Beason, general manager and president of the line, reported the flood of July 8th damaged the road to the extent of \$75,000.
 The road is the smallest in the world, having only a 57 mile run between Canisteo and Ceres, Pa. It is, however, the only medium for freight shipments out of most of this territory, which embraces Rexville, Greenwood, Whitesville, Genesee, Pa., and Shinglehouse, Pa.

Wellsville Barbecue Damaged by Fire

The Dyke street barbecue, owned by Horace Davis and operated by Leon Williams, suffered from fire, smoke and water early Saturday morning.
