THE SICK ROOM

Granted that the sick room is in- evitable in your home and you have an invalid to provide for, the sick room becomes a matter of prime importance. The recovery of the sick depends, in a large measure, upon how he is quartered.

The duration of illness may of course vary from a few hours to months or years. Hospitals have very strict rules concerning room- decorations. But we are talking about sickness in your home.

Unless the physician orders them, clear the sick-room of everything that looks like a lace curtain. Be- tween doses of medicine, the sick one finds the hours long. He may enjoy looking out of the bedroom window and his vision should not be dimmed. He may take special delight in watching the rain fall on his favorite garden or the chickens in the back yard. Anything about the place in which he may take special interest will get his attention. Believe me, a day in a pleasant sick room will equal in effect on most patients, the most soothing drugs.

I have seen many patients go to Rocky Mountain resorts confined to rolling chairs. I have invariably advised rooms having large win- dows for the shut-ins. Rooms which afforded the most magnificent scenery. What the patient looks at may be very good or indeed very bad for him.

If I have any special abhorrence in my practice, it is for the over- dressed, stuffy sick-room. The room with 15 cheap pictures on every wall and the windows bunged up with lace curtains.

## Allegany Oil Field Items

A deep-sand gas well is being put down on the Frank Robbins farm at Marsh Creek, near Whitesville. The drill is now around 3,500 feet.

J. P. Herrick & Co. are building a rig for their No. 1 well on the Howe farm, Phillips Hill, town of Bolivar. A. C. Shaner of Bolivar is the contractor.

## Hebron Gas Field Activities

The Belmont Quadrangle Drilling Corporation of Bradford tapped the sand in their well on the VanCamp- en farm at Stone Dam about two miles over the New York State line from the head of the Eleven Mile Valley, Friday and broke the drilling stem. As they started work Sat- urday the well drilled itself in with a deafening roar. The sand pro- duced at a depth of 4,760 feet. It is reported that the well is good for 32,000,000 cubic feet of gas a day.

The Allegany Gas Co. has a well at Rose Lake and one at Stone Dam that are about ready to be drilled in, both of which are close to good gas producers. The Rose Lake well is on the Hebron anticline and the other is on the Smethport anticline.
