## Weather Predictions

MOTHING approaches the weather as a subject 1 I ordinary conversation. Despite what men of science and experience have to say about weather, there are still people who believe in signs and almanacs.

From the earliest times people have sought to read. in nature indications that might be taken as guides. The goose bone, the moss on the north side of trees. and the like, were once regarded as infallible. Then are thousands of such strange cases every day. came the almanacs and advertised calendars.

The Rev. Irl Hicks for many years assumed be able to forecast the weather thruout the year dead, but calendars and almanacs continue to tell what I every day will bring forth. There is no law to prevent such predictions. The almanacs do not sell weather and are gamblers only in reputation, good or bad, as their guesses hit or misc. Men who study the weather every day are unable to make accurate forecasts

for long periods. The 24-hour forecast is reasonably accurate, for the wires give advices as to wind currents, "spells" of weather, etc. The idea of foretelling weather cond tions for every part of the country for every day i the year long enough ahead to permit the printing ar distribution of calendars by January 1 seems to assume that part of the people can be fooled all the time.


