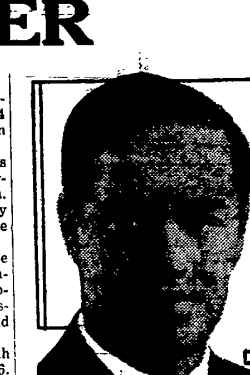

Fire and Frost

Mrs. C. T. Pitcher asks: "How can a fire be made to produce smoke to save cucumbers and tomatoes from early frosts?"

Professor G. J. Raleigh of the department of vegetable crops answers: "The building of small fires and smudges in a field of vegetables is not a satisfactory way to prevent frost damage. 'Smudge pots are sometimes used in western orchards, but I believe their use is on the decrease rather than on the increase. 'Persons who have only a few plants may cover them with baskets to prevent frost damage. Cucumbers can be started under hotkaps which give protection against light frosts.

'Larger protectors are now on the market for plants like tomatoes. These protectors may be left over the plants during both the day and night. In the early spring they are also desirable not only to protect from frost damage but to cause a more rapid growth of the plant as well. The air under the protector is warmer than the outside air."

Barley Scab

W. R. asks: "What causes the browning on the husks of the kernels of barley I sent to you?"

Professor Charles Chupp of the department of plant pathology replies: "The trouble is the fungous disease, scab, which is present in unusually large amounts in many states where barley is grown.

"The infected grain does not injure cattle, horses or sheep, but will make hogs ill and is a strong emetic to human beings. The disease is of such importance in hog-producing states that barley is sold by grades. These are determined to a large extent by the amount of the disease present.

"In New York State, where barley is fed to cattle, the scab is important only as it decreases yield.

"To reduce the scab in future crops, do not sow barley in the same field where barley, corn or wheat are grown the year before. Use seed as early healthy as possible, and treat the seed with some organic mercury compound."
