swered the call, but could only pro-
tect adjacent buildings. A large
quantity of hay, grain and farming
tools were lost. The fire was plain-
ly visible from Andover.

The project to heat Wellsville's
hospital and library with steam from
the Water & Light plant was started
Tuesday. The project is to employ
about 40 men and take about six
weeks to complete. A steam line is
to be laid from the Water and
Light plant, down the old B. & S.
right-of-way until opposite the new
library building, where it will cross
the river, a branch going to the li-
brary building and another to the
hospital.

Mrs. Marrison Sixby Blawat of
Alfred has been granted a six month
leave of absence as case supervisor
in the office of Dr. Ivan G. Howe,
Allegany county commissioner of
public welfare. She will enter the
University of Buffalo for a course of
special studies in sociology. Mrs.
Blawat was one of 14 students cho-
sen for this work from ten Western
New York counties. A scholarship
under the TERA pays her expenses
in the university.
