Bradford Bank Fails to Open Monday
The Commercial National Bank Bradford, Pa., failed to open for business Monday morning, following the death of Frank W. Calkins, 47, assistant cashier. Calkins was found dead in his garage in Bradford Saturday, from carbon monoxide poisoning. Coroner Allen who investigated the case, issued no statement as to whether his death was suicidal or accidental. A check up at the bank showed a shortage, the extent of which has not been determined. The bank deposits are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, who are preparing to pay off the depositors commencing in about ten days.
