New Marriage Law Pennsylvania's new three-day mar- riage law, designed to curb "gin weddings," and wipe out the com- mercial Greta Greens, became ef- fective October 1st. Under the new law, a couple desiring to marry must wait at least three days after ap- plying for a license before their passport to wedlock can be issued.

The bill calling for marriage by "sober selection," passed during the last session of the legislature, was drawn and introduced by Represen- tative Anna M. Brancato of Phila- delphia.
