## Around Our House

**FALL CLOTHES FOR TODDLERS**  
 Colder weather means warmer clothing for children, but regardless of the season, the child from two to six years old should have clothing that is comfortable and that allows for growth, says the New York state college of home economics.  
 With boys' suits, trousers with a wide elastic at the top should be used as long a time as possible. As he grows older, however, trousers that button onto waists are more suitable. Four buttons across the back, rather than the usual three, do away with a center button which often causes strain thru the crotch of the trousers and which fre- quently comes off. Two buttons at the side allow the back and front to be opened separately, and help to develop good toilet habits.  
 Simply tailored blouses are also appropriate for little boys. Over- blouses to wear with trousers, which have wide elastic at the top, can be put on easily and are easily cared for. Waists on which trousers but- ton need ample length below the button line to keep the waist inside the trousers. Later, as the child grows, this length provides space to set the buttons down to give more length to the suit thru the crotch.  
 Little girls' dresses also need careful consideration. They should open down the front; and one, two, or three buttons, with good-looking, easily-managed buttonholes, may decorate the dress as well as help the child to learn to dress herself. Exceptions to this practice of front openings may be made when sheer materials are used, or when the occasion demands a more dainty finish in the front of a dress. Help with dressing is usually needed for special occasions and should be given, but the joy of independence should not be sacrificed by unman- ageable every-day clothes. French panties or shorts, with wide elastic on the top, prove satisfactory under most dresses, but when sheer ma- terials are used in the dress, it is necessary to wear, in addition, a slip and panties or a combination slip-pantie.
