"Section 139 provides that the mortgage holder may redeem the property any time after the sale, and within a six months' period after notice has been received. If no notice has been given, the property can still be redeemed.

"Tax deeds are often issued subject to the serving of certain notices' before they can be recorded, Property is still subject to a mortgage, regardless of whether a tax deed has been recorded, unless notice has been filed with the mortgage holder and six months have elapsed.

"Both sections of the law went into effect on March 28, 1931. I understand they apply to all tax sales held after that date."

GARMENTS OUT OF STORAGE

Suits, sweaters and other knitted garments recently brought out of moth-proof storage may not seem attractive because they have become sleazy and out of shape thru last year's wear, says the New York state college of home economics.

Such garments should first be washed in a mild soap suds, following these usual precautions: Use a lukewarm temperature for the suds and the rinsing waters, do not rub adon into the garment rather than dousing it up and down in the suds, and the rinsing waters, do not rub as in the garment rather than wringing and twisting the garment.
