## ANDOVER BEATS HORNELL

Andover beat Hornell in basketball Tuesday night, Dec. 3rd. It was the first game for the Andover boys. The starting lineup was as follows:

Hornell got the tip-off but lost the ball. The first few minutes were fast with Hornell having the upper hand. Briggs made a bad pass and the ball went to Hornell. Gallagher fouled but again Andover failed to make the point. Hornell then called time out. Briggs made a try at a long shot in the first few seconds after time out. Hornell rallied to make the first basket. Andover came right back with a goal. McGill fouled Gallagher and the shot was bad. Andover rallied and Fulkerson made a very nice field goal. He immediately made another basket. After having another time out, Andover scored again, bringing the score 8-2. Gallagher then made a foul shot but it did not count as he stepped over the line. Andover scored again just as the first quarter ended. Score at the end of the first quarter was 10-2.

During the first few seconds of the second quarter Hornell had things their own way, but Andover broke thru on a block play to score two points. The score was then 12-2.
