The Big Eye at Corning Comes Out O. K.

Corning, Dec. 9.—The biggest and most difficult astronomical job ever undertaken, the making of a single piece of glass the size and shape of a 17-foot circus ring to become the mirror or "eye" of a 200-inch telescope, has been finished successfully at the Corning Glass Works.

The disc was removed yesterday from the oven where it has been cooling for more than a year. Its acceptance was announced by the scientists who will take it to California to grind into a mirror for the world's largest telescope.

The problem solved was like putting a 26-inch wall around the ring of a circus, filling the enclosure level with water and freezing it solid into one chunk of ice.
