N. Y. & P. Railroad To Be Junked

Stockholders of the New York & Pennsylvania Railroad corporation voted 2,868 shares against 946 in favor of scrapping the line, at a meeting in Canisteo, Thursday, December 12th.

General Manager Guy M. Beasor said application for permission to abandon will be filed as soon as possible with the Interstate Commerce Commission and the Public Service Commissions of New York and Pennsylvania.

Abandonment will mean that several thousand farmers residing between Canisteo, N. Y., and Ceres, Pa., terminals of the line 57 miles apart, will pay about \$185,000 more for transporting crops to market each year.

Gradual decreases in the road's income, plus heavy damage wrought by the July flood made abandonment necessary. Stockholders were unable to arrange a loan to finance repairs.

Y.

Fifty-three Grange women took part in the State match, each one being a champion in her own county, having won her title in local matches in which over 2,220 women from 425 Subordinate Granges originally took part.

Prizes carried off by Mrs. Cook included a Perfection oven, a dozen Ball jars, six tins of Colonial molasses, can of Calumet baking powder and cook book, a silver service set from General Mills, Inc., can of International smoke salt, 24 1/2 pound sack of Pillsbury's Best flour and Sno Sheen cake flour, a 24 1/2 pound sack of Heckers' Superlative flour, and a large size tube of Worcester toothpaste and toothbrush. Similar prizes were awarded to nine other women who held high scores. First prize winner, Mrs. Merrill Baker of Albany county, also got \$25 in cash from the American Agriculturist and a Kalamazoo coal and wood range.
