We can't make any suggestions about the number, but we have some ideas about the foods to serve, Here's the menu for a delictious dinner for eight people.

two tablespoons mayonnaise and
the contents of a 2½-ounce can
deviled ham, and mix thoroughly.
Refill the whites with this mixture, then press the two halves together and wrap in waxed paper.

garnish. Turn the reat

four tablespoons butter, add four tablespoons four, and sitr until thickened and smooth. Then add the asparagus and stock liquor, stirring constautly until smooth and creamy. Add one-half cup cream, season to taste with salt, pepper and nutmeg and serve.

Make a while sauce of four table spoons butter, four tablespoons four, two cups top mik or light cream, salt, pepper and paprika. Add one tablespoon lemon juice slowly.
