DRIVING LICENSES FOR THREE YEARS

New Law Effective Jan. 1—You Will Get a Three Year License When One Expires.

Albany, N. Y.—An important announcement relative to all operators' licenses was issued last week by Charles A. Harnett, Motor Vehicle Commissioner.

"Effective January 2nd," Mr. Harnett, "all persons applying for original drivers' licenses submit their application accompanied by a two dollar fee. The license then issued will be valid for a period of three years."

Amended by Chapters 905 and 914 in the Laws of 1936, this law was to become effective at the discretion of the Commission of Motor Vehicles. In selecting this year as the most suitable for the new ruling, Commissioner Harnett said, "It must be clear to the motoring public, this new law will not affect the license holders of motor vehicle licenses until such licenses expire on Jan. 1st. At that time, when applications for renewals, they will receive a new three-year form. There will be no change at present in the license issued to chauffeurs or junior operators. These will remain unaltered until further notice."

The persons directly affected by the new law are those persons who, at the time of applying for an operator's license, the commissioner further stated that this new measure will give greater protection to the driver of the state.

"At various times my attention has been called to the short duration of the present license," he said. "With this new type of license operators will be assured of a year period of driving untroubled by renewals unless they are guilty of violations of the vehicle traffic law, which warrants suspension or revocation of their license."
