These substances! elements. become a certain type of lead which can be identified! as originating in this manner. A these substances break down they give off another substance called helium. The speed with which these unstable substances pass from one stage to another is accurately known by experiment. It has also been discovered that no known factors! can influence the rate of this transformation. With these known facts' at his disposal, the scientist can determine the age of a rock by the relative amounts of these substances' that it contains.
