Rural Free Delivery of Mail Established 1896

Rural free delivery of mail was established on Oct. 1, 1896. Such a service was first officially suggested by Postmaster General John Wanamaker, in his annual report for the fiscal year 1891.

On Jan. 5, 1892, James O'Donnell of Michigan introduced a bill in the House of Representatives authorizing rural mail delivery. His bill carried an appropriation of \$6,000,000. It did not pass. Later Thomas E. Watson, a congressman from Georgia, sponsored a bill which appropriated \$10,000 for experimental rural mail delivery.

On June 9, 1896, the sum of \$10,000, together with the former appropriations of \$30,000, was made available, and the first experimental rural mail delivery service was established on Oct. 1 of that year, simultaneously on three routes—from Charles Town, Uvilla and Halltown, all in West Virginia.

Eclipse of Sun Brought Fear to Indian Villages

An eclipse of the sun on June 17, 1808, brought fear to the Indian villages of Ohio, recalls a writer in the Cleveland Plain Dealer.
When without warning the sun began to enter the shadow of the moon the savages became terrified. In many villages they formed their customary large circles and began dancing, yelling, shooting into the air, and firing their guns in a frantic effort to scare away the evil spirit.

One Indian, who happened to fire his gun about the time the shadow began passing, declared triumphantly that it was his shot that frightened the evil spirit away. His claim was accepted by his fellow tribesmen, who made him chief.

The Salton Sea

The Salton sea or sink, a depression 280 feet below sea level, is located in the desert in the extreme southern part of California. It is one of the numerous salt lakes or lake beds in that part of the country, but it has had a more unusual history than most of them. Its salty sands usually absorb all the waters fed it by a few small creeks, but there are periods when they do not. In 1891 it became a lake, which soon dried up. The lake began to form again in 1893. In 1905 some of the waters of the Colorado river were diverted into it, as apparently they had been in the past, and it rose to its fullest size. In July, 1907, the break in the river was closed and the sea again became a desert.

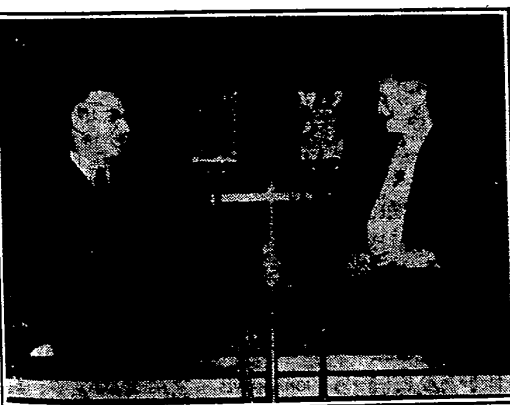

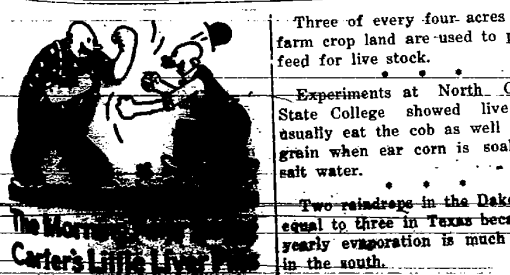

SAGAS OF THE SKIES

THE fate of two marooned hunters and their rescue pilot hung in the balance! Was an attempt to take off in a 150-yard stretch of water utter folly or could an experienced north woods aviator accomplish this task? How was their already none too successful hunting trip in the Geneva lake district of Ontario to end?
These burning questions scorched the minds of Rodman M. Price and Ernest Andrews, two New Yorkers, when the speed of the cabin plane increased from 50 to 60, to 70 and then to 80 mph an hour across the open water of the cove. Closer and closer the rim of the lake ice loomed. A crash seemed inevitable to all except Pilot Phil Sauve, who brought the plane out of the water 10 feet from the death-dealing obstruction over which the pontoons skinned with only inches to spare. Their rescue was complete. In a few hours, although eight days overdue, they were back in the anxious arms of relatives at Lake Penage, relating experiences of hardships endured in a trapper's shack in which they had sought refuge when they were "frozen in" in the wilds of Northern Ontario. After bagging a moose on the first day in, their luck turned. Sub-zero weather caught them and made the 50-mile return canoe and portage trip impossible. Complications increased when Bill Hottl, a guide, became sick. Provisions ran low with only moose meat for food. Their situation was desperate.
Then T. H. Kingston, guide and expert bushman, set out for help. Snow and ice, brush and thickets in the wild woods were their enemies. But they had to meet him at Lake Friday—18 miles distant—a more suitable landing space of open water. Sauve was too smart a pilot to tempt fate again.

Through Kingston's expert guidance, Sauve brought his plane directly above the shack which was almost completely hidden amid the tall timbers. Food was dropped in a parachute to the huddled occupants overhead before deciding to alight on the small amount of open water available. Sauve accomplished a feat of breathless proportions when he held his descent perfectly through the rough air between mountainous walls rising on each side of the cove to make a perfect landing.
The real test followed, white Kingston and Hottl remained behind to lighten the plane's load. The guides were rescued in the subsequent trip which Sauve made for them and the camping equipment. But they had to meet him at Lake Friday—18 miles distant—a more suitable landing space of open water. Sauve was too smart a pilot to tempt fate again.
