NEW COURT HOUSE NOW IMMINENT

Committee to Recommend New \$200,000 Building Replace Old at Meeting March 2.

We understand that the committee appointed by Chairman Gere of Board of Supervisors, to investigate and make recommendations for a new building to replace the old one at the county seat, will make a report and recommendations at the March 2nd meeting of the board. The news is very reliably reported that this committee, consisting of Supervisors F. M. Alvord of Friendship, J. Hobart Rockwell of Wellsville and Earl Franklin of Belmont together with former County Clerk Fred L. Utter of Friendship found it impractical to reconstruct the old court house and make adequate for the present needs of the county to say nothing of what the future may have in store.

According to reports, the committee now has under consideration two sets of plans each calling for a three story building, to be erected on the site of the present house, which they estimate cost \$200,000 and equipped for \$200,000. The committee has prepared figures showing the cost in terms of taxes, which such a building would cost. Finance a term of 20 years this building would average of 21.3 three mills to the tax rate.

In speaking of this proposition, P. M. Alvord, chairman of the committee describes the present situation in the county offices, especially in the office of the county clerk and county treasurer. He says that all fire-proof storage space for priceless public records in the files must be provided for. The possibility of building an addition to the present clerk's building has been considered but builder declared it would cost \$20,000 to build such addition and it be then but a temporary and unsatisfactory remedy.

A plan to build an addition to the old court house also been considered, chairman said. But investigation showed it to be in condition. It is built of stone and the old timbers in it are affected with powder rot and conditions have settled.

If it is absolutely necessary a more room be provided for county seat, there will be no time than the present to undertake the erection of a new building. Labor is plentiful and building material is reasonable and more interest.

Altho plans are still in the tentative stage and the whole proposition has yet to be voted of the Board of Supervisors as a whole the plan under consideration of the committee the removal of the old 78 courthouse, the county clerk's office, the treasurer's building, the Farm, Home and 4-H departments building. Only the jail and sheriff's residence, present surrogate's building remain.

The proposed new building on the approximate site of present court house, according to the plan, would have an ample room, space for offices of the clerk, county treasurer, high court department, county surrogate department, county auditor's room, a board of supervisors' room, judges' chambers, district attorney's office and office of the board.

Under this plan, the farm and 4-H departments would be the present surrogate's office, while other departments of government, aside from the department, would be in the building, heated by oil burning plant.

On Monday evening, March 2nd, at 7:30 p. m., at the auditorium in Wellsville will be held an information which it is hoped of the taxpayers will be present in Allegany county from towns
