NEW COURT HOUSE
IS ORDER

Unanimous Action of
Supervisors. Chairman of
Appoints Building Com-
mittee.

Belmont, Mar. 9.—Allegation by supervisors yesterday voted to not one single adverse voice, to a new court house and county building upon the site of the present inadequate 78-year-old structure. The decision followed careful study of the situation by the supervisors' committee, headed by Supervisor Francis M. Alvord, and by county of Friendship, and by county of Belmont since serious consideration given the project at the November 1936 annual meeting of the supervisors. The resolution to build and finance the new court house and county building was taken from the meeting, was taken from the motion of John N. Thompson and after a few minutes of consideration given to the Means and Finance Committee of the board for their disapproval before action. This followed formal and secret ballot of the board for the guidance of the committee.

The two committees met daily following lunch and at 2:15 in the afternoon before were ready to report with their report.

The text of the resolution to the floor from the Finance and Means Committee. The vote was taken as follows: "Your committee on Finance and Means herein recommend the adoption of the resolution for the new court house committee created by that committee in creation of a combined county and county building on the site of the present county building within the appropriation of terms and conditions stated as revised and

"Further, that on majority of the supervisors the same be adopted and authorized.

"Signed: F. L. Gere, H. J. Nich, J. N. Thompson, Morris E. W. Barber, F. M. Alvord, Miller, J. H. Rockwell, N. Langame and H. L. Bloss."

The revised resolution reads: "1. Be it resolved that the Supervisors of Allegany hereby authorize the building of a combined new court house and county building to be built on the same site as the building.

"2. Be it resolved that the Supervisors hereby authorize the issue of \$225,000 for the purpose and that the county in conjunction with the Finance Committee of this board, be authorized and instructed to arrange bond issue.

"3. Be it resolved that the issue for the purpose of such combined new court county building be spread over a period of 15 years, the term to start one year date of such bond issue, \$15,000 in each year. Be resolved that the finance of this board be authorized the exact terms, interest which they consider to be the best interest of the county.

"4. Be it resolved that the man of this board appointed a committee of three supervisors to supervise and building within the limits of appropriation made therefor. Be it authorized that the combined county and court house is built on the site of the present building whether by the letting of or by the construction of or proper supervision, by labor as far as possible. Be it herein authorized to engage competent personnel, select the architect plans after careful consideration. In announcing the construction of the county's new court house, Chairman Gere said: "The following committee of three supervisors with the authority to supervise a combined court house building within the limits of appropriation therefore: Alvord, Friendship, Belmont and Leo of Bolivar."
