Proposed State Roads in Towns of Independence, Willing and Almond, West Almond.
Albany, April 1.—A bill authorizing the construction of two new state highways in Allegany County was today in the hands of Governor Lehman, after a record breaking passage of the measure, sponsored by Assemblyman William H. Kenzie of Belmont, thru both houses of the Legislature.
One of the highways contemplated is in the south east corner of the townships of Independence and West Almond. The other is in the middle section of the townships of Almond and West Almond. The proposed road will be between ten and eight miles in length that in the Almond-West area will be between ten and miles.
The state highway department in accord with the program of this, it is expected Governor Lehman will sign the measure affirming the action was brought about cooperation of Assemblyman Kenzie, superintendent of the county highways, Harry E. Canasera, and Harry E. Canasera, chairman of the county board of supervisors.
Because the state was lax in the construction of proposed state highway in county, the present course was brought about to secure legislation for construction of ways proposed by the measure.
By the Greene map (the map of the State Department which they record their new state highways, proposed (struck) the state was to have a highway from West Carl Richburg, but for several here delayed such construction accordingly, this construction be taken over by the county.
Likewise, another highway ready constructed, and built state, will be taken over county, as part of the county.
