COUNTY BANKERS MEET IN ANDOVER One Hundred Per Cent Representation, With 100 Present. Guests from New York and Buffalo. The regular bi-monthly gathering of the Allegany County Bank Association was held Monday evening in the parlors of the Presbyterian church in Andover. Every one in the county responded to the call and there were guests from New York, Buffalo and Steuben county present. The banquet was most sumptuous and was splendidly served by the ladies of the Presbyterian church. One hundred and three plates were laid in the commodious parlors of the church and the menu included a roast turkey dinner, to which speaker paid high tribute. Denzel Baker, violin, and Mrs. L. Bloss, piano, furnished the musical inspiration for the banquet. The meeting was called to order by President Harland Sotrore, Jr. of the Belmont State Bank. The routine business of the association was concluded. The president called upon Clifford Post of York, secretary of the State Bankers Association, who complimented the association upon their 100 per cent representation at the meeting and gave timely suggestions as to how the bankers present, in being warned them to prepare the bank robber in carrying insurance and to also take proper procedure for their help when their vaults were penetrated. Prof. Ray W. Wingate of Andover was present with a male quartet among whom was Wisner C. Andover. The quartet brought great applause from all present and were repeatedly encouraged to sing and responded willingly. The meeting closed with beautiful harmony during evening. President Sotrore then introduced M. H. Whitmer, chairman of the committee of the entertainment of the group one, and on April 24 as the next meeting group at Hotel Statler, Buffalo. William B. Bundy, a former Andover booster and an ardent citizen was present and asked him to give of his experiences in the business, which he did in a jovial manner, telling how he had as a boy to work in a bank; how he advanced from boy to coal to the furnace to the upstairs, and finally to the ship of the private bank in Buffalo. He paid the late A. M. B. high compliment in his toast to the start of banking in Andover in 1838. In introducing the speaker, Hon. Jesse S. Phillips, Sotrore said that he knew Mr. Phillips, he was introduced to him as Hon. Jesse S. Phillips, Mr. Phillips' address might be divided into four subjects: 1. The people in Allegany toward their bankers; 2. Deposit Insurance; 3. Sotrore's own experience; and the Supreme Court.
