Are Your Feet Comfortable?

The tired feeling that sometimer comes in the Spring may be caused partly by shorts. Many homemak. ers think it economical to wear any old pair while working in the hombut this is often a mistake, says the York State College of Ho The three men will be together again in exactly 60 days, since this is the least common multiple of the number of days the three men took Economics.

To wear shoes with run heels is bad for they not only throw the body out of alignment but they the body out or aignment but they wear a person out. Shoes must be comfortable, in good repair, and suited to a person's foot. Rubber heels are good for all kinds of shoes because they lessen the jar received in walking.

Only the best type of shoe should be worn during working hours. The

Only the best type of shoe should be worn during working hours. The "best type" of shoe, one which maintains foot health and comfort, meets the following requirements:

First, a straight inner line. This may be verified by holding both shoes in the hands, soles up and inner edges together with heels and balls touching. The less divergence the better for the great toe.

Second, a broad roomy toe, with no pressure from the toe cap or seam.

Third, a broad, low heel. Fourth, correct width and length.
The feet should be measured while
standing each time shoes are purchased. The length should be an
inch longer than the foot, the width not more than one-quarter inch nar-

A good way to rest tired feet dur-ing the day is to remove the shoes and stockings and to lie on a bed with the legs at right angles to the with the legs at right angles to the body and against the headboard of the bed or against the wall. Other aids are a daily bath with warm soap and water; a good scrubbing with a foot brush to stimulate cir-culation; and soaking in salt water to toughen tender feet.
