J. B. writes: "I have several large English boxwood trees which are more than 90 years old. They were healthy until last spring when the leaves began to turn brown; some of the twigs died. I am enclosing sample of the leaves.

"Could this be due to cold weath er or to disease? What would you advise to strengthen the trees?"

browning of boxwood leaves in the spring. The plants are very sensi-tive to extreme cold and in this climate, must be protected, otherwise winter injury is likely to follow.

"It is always good practice to re move dead twigs and branches from such plants. If you could send some of these to us, we might possibly be able to tell you more. We have also sent you a leaflet that describes one common disease of boxwood and another that gives suggestions fertilizing."
