Bible School Lesson

The Obedience of Noah
Lesson for April 25. Genesis 9:8-17
Golden Text: Hebrews 11:7
The tradition of a great flood is not peculiar to our Bible. Almost every branch of the human race cherishes this bit of folk-lore. The vivid Babylonian story of this overwhelming catastrophe possesses many points of resemblance to the narrative in Genesis, but it lacks a religious message. The glory of the Bible is that it always introduces God. And so our lesson tells us not merely of a flood, but of a God who sent the flood. And it presents Noah not only as a brave hero, but as a true servant of God, a "sanctified shipbuilder" as one sympathetic student calls him.
Now we are tempted to think that the story of Noah has no meaning for our day, that he passed thru an experience so unusual, so remote
