## ANDOVER LOSES TO BOLIVAR

May 12 will bring to a close the days in which pupils and teachers have been making preparations for the school exhibit. The exhibit will be comprised of very interesting material. Each class, or series of classes will exhibit some special work.

The English I. Class will present posters on "Better Speeches". They also are making booklets of various types concerning poetry.

English II. plan to have a showing of practical correspondence. All so they have prepared biographies of authors and book reviews.

English III. are offering a great variety of material, most of which is based on the study of "The House of Seven Gables, including a real house."
