SUPERVISORS MAP ROAD PROGR

authorize Two New Co Highways and One Co Bridge at Canaseraga Total Cost \$67,000.

The Allegany County Board of Supervisors, at their May meeting, authorized two new highways and extended its highway systems by \$67,000. The most costly single piece of work will be a 76-foot steel bridge at Canaseraga. The estimated cost of the bridge will be \$20,000. The bridge will have a 14-foot roadway and a six-foot sidewalk.

Two and one-half miles of bridge at Richburg-West Clarksville are estimated to cost \$10,000; two and one-half miles from Corners to State Road No. 1, \$15,000; Alfred State Road, \$8,000; and one and one-half miles of base on Part 1 of Route 15, Rosburgh to Grangeville, \$10,000.

Two roads were added to the county highway map: Beginning at Corners, town of Whitesburg to Spiers Corners, to Independence, thence to Corners and to intersect with county highway, about seven miles in the towns of Willing and Independence. The second road is in the hamlet of Alma, runs in town of Willing and to an intersection with County Route 29, Stone Dam.

The board voted to permit United States to acquire title to lands in the town of Rosburgh under option to the Resettlement administration. Slocum was authorized to deposit \$25,000 proceeds of the new bonds in county banks until for payment of construction.
