Tree to Mark Birthday of Conservationist

A white pine tree was planted at Warrensburg, N. Y., on the Charles Lathrop Pack Demonstration Forest Friday morning, May 7th, by the New York State College of Forestry at Syracuse, in celebration of the 80th birthday of Charles Lathrop Pack, president of the American Tree Association. This tree will be a companion to the George Washington tree planted in front of the rustic lodge along the main highway running north and south between Lake George and Montreal. The Washington pine was set out in 1931 to commemorate the bicentennial of Washington's birthday. The Pack white pine stands beside the Washington tree and was planted by Dean Samuel N. Spring, Professors Ralph T. King and Svend Heiberg, with the assistance of the director of the Pack Forest, Clifford H. Foster, and

the junior class of the college encamped on the Pack Demonstration Forest for instructional work.

Mr. Pack, donor of several college forests, has given to the New York State institution two forests, one of 1,000 acres on the shores of Cranberry Lake, the site of the Sophomore Summer Camp of the college, and the forest of 2,250 acres, three miles north of Warrensburg. This forest is used for demonstrational purposes, research, public and student instruction. The forest has in it some of the finest virgin white pines left in the state and for that reason is sometimes called the Show Window Forest. But practical forest management is being carried on under the direction of the college; a modern sawmill makes possible logging operations; considerable research has been done on the area in connection with the white pine blight, rust, erosion, tree nursery work and reforestation.



Homemakers' Exchange of Helpful Household Hints and Recipes

To lighten the task of sprinkling clothes on washday, try spraying them with a fine soft mist from your rubber hose.

A good recipe for PLAIN PASTRY MIX: Sift together 3 cups of all-purpose flour and 2 1/2 teaspoons of salt. Cut in 1 cup of shortening. Store in modern ice refrigerator for future use. The pastry dough will keep fresh, because the air-conditioning chamber of the ice refrigerator provides proper moisture which prevents rapid drying out of foods and clean-washed air which eliminates the mingling of food flavors. When ready to use, remove desired amount of mix (allow 1 1/4 cups for each single 9" crust). Moisten with ice water (use approximately 3 1/2 tablespoons for each individual crust). Mix gently with a fork. Then roll out on a lightly floured board, and bake in a hot oven (450°) for 12 to 15 minutes. Makes 3 pastry shells.

To keep your recipe cards from getting soiled, but still in plain view when in use, tuck a pincher clothespin to the inside of your kitchen cabinet door in such a way as to permit the clothespin to pinch and hold any desired card. Then all you need do is to pinch the recipe card in place and it is ready for use.

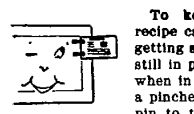
The next time you serve oatmeal for breakfast plan to make a little extra. Then pack the left-over cereal in buttered baking powder cans. Place in ice refrigerator, where it will stay fresh until needed. Then, when ready to use, unroll, slice, and fry in butter. Serve with maple syrup.

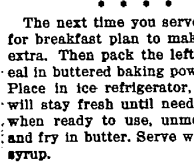
When pitting dates dip the knife with which the stone is being removed, in boiling water, and the stone will loosen easily.

ORANGE FUDGE CAKE
Cream 1/2 cup of butter and add 1 1/2 cups of sugar slowly. Beat well. Add grated rind of 1/2 orange. Mix and add together 2 1/2 cups of cake flour, 4 teaspoons baking powder and 1/4 teaspoon salt. Blend into the creamed mixture. Then store in modern ice refrigerator until ready to bake. When desired, remove from refrigerator and break up the mixture with a fork. Shave 2 ounces of unsweetened chocolate and melt over low flame in saucepan. Add 1 cup of milk. Blend well. Then remove from flame and add 2 beaten egg yolks. Add this liquid mixture to the cake mix. Blend thoroughly and fold in egg white, beaten until stiff. Pour into layer cake pans and bake 35 minutes in a moderate oven (350°). Serve with home made ice cream—made in the agitated way in the new-fashioned ice cream freezers. The actual freezing time is only 5 minutes and the ice cream is smooth and velvety.

You'll find it helpful if you make the appropriate initial on top of your two-crust pies to indicate what kind they are.
