**Allegany County 4-H Pens Rank High in State Contest**

Allegany county entries in the State 4-H egg laying contest at Horseheads continue to rank high in the contest. At the end of the 32nd week of the contest Chrales Witter's pen of five New Hampshire pullets have laid a total of 668 eggs scoring a total of 713.65 points, Robert Macauley's pen of five Barred Rocks have laid a total of 735 eggs scoring 798.3 points and Arby Swift's pen of New Hampshire's a total of 669 eggs scoring 696.8 points. The leading pen in the contest to date is owned by Summer Stowell of Orange county. This pen of five Rhode Island Reds has laid a total of 775 eggs, scoring 792.85 points. Robert Macauley's Barred Rock is the high Allegany county entry with a record of 160 eggs, scoring 165.2 points.
