Free Pamphlets Issued

Albany, May 19.—The annual battle against the common pest and germ carrier, the fly, will soon be under way thruout the State, and the State Department of Health is prepared to aid city and rural dwellers in eliminating the insect.

The department has reprinted for popular distribution its pamphlet entitled "The Fly." This pamphlet not only explains how the fly may spread disease, but it outlines practical methods of fly control, how flies breed, prevention of breeding, use of chemicals to kill maggots, how to construct fly traps at home, and the use of screens in the home.

Persons wishing to obtain free copies of the pamphlet may secure them by sending their requests to the Division of Public Health Education, State Department of Health, Albany, N. Y.

Get Higher Production

A study of records in New York dairy herd improvement associations completed during 1936, shows an average production of 8,101 pounds of milk and 310 pounds of butterfat for 43,103 cows in 1,184 herds.

Each year for the past 15 years or more, cows in the association have increased their production, while the average production of all cows in the state has remained about stationary, between 5,000 and 5,500 pounds of milk. More dairymen are testing their cows, and their herds are improving year by year, according to G. W. Tailby of the Cornell agricultural extension service.

Most pastures cannot provide the needs of the high producing cow after the first few weeks of the pasture season. Additional feeding of grain and possibly some hay and silage may be necessary.
