Joseph's Readiness for Service
Lesson for June 6, Genesis 41:33-44
Golden Text: Proverbs 22:29.

We first see Joseph as unpopular with his brothers because his father favored him. Then we note how finely the lad bore himself when adversity, thru the connivance of his brothers, laid its heavy hand upon him.

And now we see him, by a miracle of providential good fortune, elevated to a post of the highest responsibility. Storing the surplus corn of the plentiful years in granaries with the utmost administrative skill, Joseph was able to soften the ravages of a prolonged famine.

How large a part does luck play in life? The goddess Fortune, with a bandage on her eyes, stands by a wheel, turning it round and round, and drawing from it blanks and prizes without regard to merit or demerits.
