A DISH FOR THE WEEK

It takes skill and forethought to cut down on meat bills by using cheaper and therefore less tender cuts of meat, and to have them appetizing, says the New York College of Home Economics. Mock Duck is one way to prepare less tender cuts of beef.

Mock Duck

Put two pounds of beef from the lower part of the round through the meat chopper. Season it well with salt and pepper. Flatten the meat into an oblong shape and spread it with potato stuffing. Fold the meat together, turn it into a baking dish, place thin slices of salt pork over the top and bake from 40 to 50 minutes in the oven heated to about 350 degrees Fahrenheit. Potato stuffing:

2 cups of cold mashed potatoes
1 small onion, finely minced
1 tablespoon of butter
1 small piece of bacon, minced
pepper.

1 stalk of celery, finely minced, or 1/2 teaspoon of celery salt
1 teaspoon of salt
The college suggests serving with the Mock Duck: scalloped tomatoes, buttered string beans, cranberry sauce, whole wheat muffins, baked apples stuffed with dates and nuts, and milk, at least for the children.
