Wellsville-Man Commits Suicide

John Prindle, 47, was found dead in front of his residence on Proctor Terrace, Tuesday morning, the left side of his head riddled by a charge of shot. A 12-gauge shotgun lay nearby. Neighbors claim to have heard a shot about 9:30 the evening before, but thought nothing of it. The body was found the next morning.

Coroner Cooley decided the shooting was self-inflicted as there was no evidence of foul play and Prindle was worried over financial and domestic troubles. He and his wife had recently parted.

His wife and four children survive. Services were held Thursday afternoon at the Piper funeral home and interment made in Woodlawn cemetery.

Fancher Guilty of Petit Larceny

Homer P. Fancher of Scio was found guilty of petit larceny by a jury in county court late Friday afternoon.

Fancher was charged on complaint of Thomas J. McAndrew of Andover, drilling contractor, with theft of a gas engine, but countered with a contention supported by testimony of seven other witnesses that he was in partnership with McAndrew.

McAndrew denied existence of any partnership and Fancher was unable to produce a written record to prove his contention that he was a partner of McAndrew until 1930. The engine was dismantled and parts from it sold by Fancher several months ago.

Sentence was deferred by Judge Hopkins until the latter part of this week.

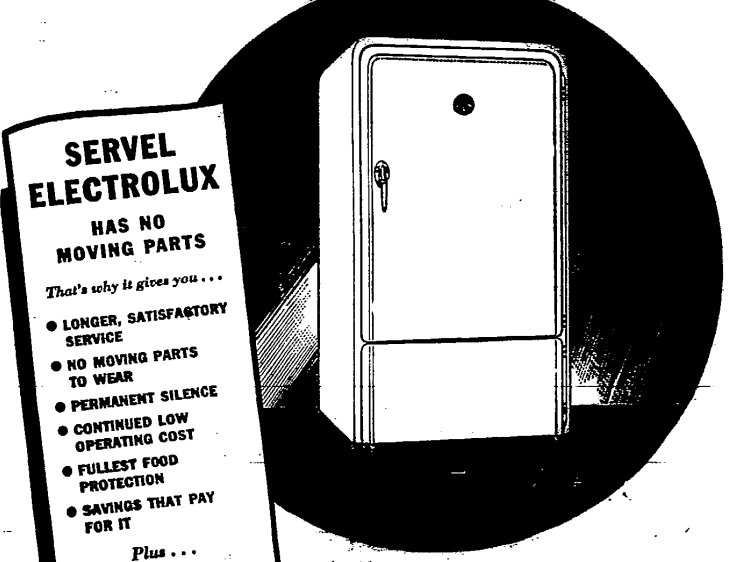
