Must Renew Chauffeurs License Now

Albany, June 14.—Frankly expressing his disappointment at the lack of response on the part of chauffeurs to renew their driving licenses, all of which expire at midnight, June 30th, Commissioner of Motor Vehicles Charles A. Harnett has pointed out that at the close of business last Saturday, 90 per cent of the 750,000 chauffeurs in the State of New York had failed to renew their licenses after having been granted an extension of 30 days from May 31st.

"The Bureau of Motor Vehicles is doing all possible to provide every public convenience in the renewal of these licenses, but our efforts will accomplish little or nothing by way of preventing last minute congestion and inconvenience to the public unless, with only 14 working days remaining in which to renew 675,000 chauffeurs' licenses, we have the immediate and sustained co-operation of those whose licenses must be renewed," the Commissioner said.

Chauffeurs' licenses are now being renewed at all issuing offices and by mail for a period of three years when the application is accompanied by the two photographs required and a fee of \$4.00, together with the renewal stub of the license expiring June 30th. Holders of current chauffeurs' license who desire to renew for one year may do so by applying in person at an issuing office and filing the completed application with a fee of \$2.00.
