The above chart illustrates the improvement in "real" hourly earnings manufacturing workers that took place from 1919 to 1937. Earnings moved upward, while the cost of living went down, making it possible for workers to my more for their money. This is particularly noticeable in the recovery viod since 1932. It should be kept in mind, however, that the average number hours worked has been substantially reduced in recent years. On the other hand, the buying power of the consumer's deliar has increased somewhat more than is indicated because of improvement in the quality of goods and services used in the cost-of-living index.


