William Shannon, lease superintendent of the Moore Oil Company, was instantly killed Friday by a nitro glycerine explosion.

A shot had been placed in a well at Allentown and didn't go off. The shooter then dropped a jack-squib and that failed. Then the sand-head or firing-head method of firing was resorted to.

The sand-head shell which contained four quarts of nitro was lowered into the hole and failed to unhook, so that the shooter brought the shell back up again with his line. Shannon was sitting on the driller's stool when the shell came out. It is assumed the shell struck the pulley on which the line was being operated, setting it off. Shannon was horribly mutilated.

Three others in the well, Angelo E. Tower, Edward White and Vincent Matthews were badly injured.

COUNTY YOUTH CAMP AUG. 15-29

Tents at Eggleston Park Are Replaced by Cabins This Year—Joe Palone Will Be in Charge.

The Allegany County Youth Camp sponsored by the Allegany County 4-H Club will be held at Eggleston Park from August 15th to August 29th. This camp should be of especial interest to boys and girls in Allegany county as it is the only camp open to all boys and girls in the county between the ages of 8 and 20. All campers will have their quarters in cabins this year. These cabins have been built by the American Legion, the towns of Angelica, Amity, Alma, Andover, Independence and Willing, Wellsville and Whitesville.

Joe Palone, physical director of Belmont High School, who was director of the 4-H Camp last year will be in charge of the camp this year. The camp will be staffed by exper-

enced college trained leaders who will give courses in nature study, camping and woodcraft, first aid, crafts and pottery. Instruction will be given to all campers in swimming and life-saving, and boating and canoeing to all campers who qualify by passing swimming tests and securing permission from their parents. The nature study course includes hikes, specimen mounting and the identification of the various flora and fauna in the surrounding countryside.

The first aid course prepares boys and girls to cope with common accidents that happen in the daily routine of life. The camping and woodcraft course prepares the camper for life in the open country and includes preparation and keeping of various types of fires, selection of a campsite, preparation of outdoor meals, and the packing of compact camp roll. The crafts courses this year will include teaching of leathercraft. The pottery course covers the modeling of clay objects. An athletic program including several outdoors sports is provided for in the afternoon and early evening.
