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## ANDOVER PEOPLE INSPECT SPRINGS

### Village Officials Con Group on Inspection of Springs.—Chlorine in Water Yet.

A group of some 25 Andover changeites and citizens journeyed to our springs Tuesday afternoon for an inspection tour with the board.

Commissioner Rennells conducted the party over the steep side of the brush to the spring houses and the spring houses. The general condition of the springs as far as cleanliness catch basins etc., would not warrant any particular criticism. However, there is undoubtedly some water getting away from a number of the springs, the exact amount which cannot be adequately estimated due to the exceptional weather we have had of late. Several of the springs which are running over Commissioner Rennells would under ordinary conditions be producing only a small amount of water.

After the trip around the village the party was taken back to the house which has been closed to house the chlorine plant. Chlorine plant, however, has not been installed, the machine simply inside the building with the pipes still in it, as it came from the factory.

After the group had assembled at the chlorine house, Dr. S. B. Reed, health officer, read communications from the Health Department and reported samples taken by the board.

The reports which dated 1934, showed no alarming condition in water contamination over a period of time, but each and every one of them was recommended to the discontinuance of the catch basin at the springs and physical repairing and fixing the springs in general.

As the writer sees the situation it seems that there has been a change of personnel in the State Department of Health, the former health officer had charge of this had made recommendations been very lenient with the Board in the matter of the execution of the recommendations. We now have a new job and from the tone of communication it is evident isn't going to be so lenient.

The final analysis of the water, according to the state report, Andover water is not satisfactory. The State Department and two things must be done. First, fix up the plant physically, discontinue the use of the spring, discontinue the use of the well spring, unless for emergency use, so no surface water enters the catch basins or enters the water supply.

Mayor Livermore, in stating the Village Board's position, said he was not the desire or intention of the board to chlorinate Andover unless compelled to do so. He stated that since this water had been agitated that it had had three different engines on the ground and all of them stated that nothing could be done to fix up the spring. The present surplus water ceded and the water was normal so it would be possible to determine the source of the water, whether it came from a side vein or from a "wet weather" spring. The miners also stated that it was impossible to do the work on the springs without polluting the water to such an extent that it requires treatment before it is for use.

Mayor Livermore told the group in the minds of the people it was thought best to go ahead and fix up the springs according to recommendations of engineers as soon as possible, and then the water could be obtained from the springs directly, that would state inspection to discontinue use of the chlorine plant for emergency use only. This water condition is that the present board is being blamed for, as it is brought out that these have dated back some years.
