

Completion of the spring sign-up in the Agricultural Conservation program shows that 61,249 farmers from New York state's 55 agricultural counties have signed work sheets, according to an announcement by Earl A. Flansburgh, state executive officer. The entire field' force now works on verifying performance so that checks may be issued to farmers as soon as possible. Farmers who still wish to take part, but have not yet filed a work sheet, may carry out approved practices on their farms, and an opportunity will be given them to enter! the program between Sept. 1 and

Dec. 1. The state executive officer says he expects at least 8,000 more farmers to participate this year. 


